A Woodturning Woodie in Twenty Quick

<u>Woodturner in question Fred Robjent</u> <u>AKA Freddie R</u> AKA The Liberon Lad

Place of birth? Devenport in Tasmania (God's country). The family left there when I was about ten years old and came to the mainland.

Now residing? I now live at Willow Drive in Moss Vale with my wife Chris. Been there for about 59 years.

Occupation now or in previous life? I'm retired now but in an earlier life was a Jackeroo for two years on the 1200 sq.mile cattle station "Oban" in Queensland. After Queensland I went to the "Blue Circle" cement works power station in Berrima as a leading hand turbine operator, qualifying for my Steam and Boiler Tickets. When the power station closed down I multiskilled and obtained my Trade Certificates for Boiler making and Welding. I was with "Blue Circle" over there at Berrima for a total of 38 years.

Interest in turning began when/how? I had my first taste of working with wood while at school and I found that I really enjoyed it and that enjoyment stayed with me over the years, so much so that when I retired I bought myself a wood lathe and started turning.

Have you had any turning tuition? I have had some tuition. I had a couple of days with Richard Raffin and a week with Frank Bollins in Oyster Bay. Time very well spent believe me.

Do you have a workshop or area as such? I share half of a two-car garage. The car has one half and I get the other.

Do you have a lathe? I do have a lathe. A Taiwanese MC900 that came from Hare and Forbes over there in Parramatta. Had it about 12 years I suppose.

What other machinery do you have? A band saw, Triton workbench, a drop saw as well most of the usual woodworking hand and powered tools that you find in most workshops.

Preferred turning tool? The spindle gouge and Crisp's deep hole borer.

Favourite turning timber? Rosewood and Huon .



Preferred Finish? LIBERON and Shellawax on the pens.

Has your turning been influenced by anything/body? I would say Bill Shean and by the various demonstrators that have visited us here in the Highlands.

Do you have a preference in turning i.e. bowls spindle etc.? Definitely spindle work.

Do you have a favourite piece that you have made? There is a mahogany standard lamp and table set that I made some time ago. It stands about 2-metres high. I would say that that was my favourite piece.

What has been your most difficult/intricate/failed piece? Acrylic pens that chip. Very frustrating.

Is there any particular aspect of your turning you would like to improve? The lot.

Is there any particular project that you wish to accomplish at some time? I would like to make a perfume atomizer at some time.

What do you like and \or dislike about woodturning? The dust.

Is there a particular benefit you feel you have gained from the craft? The camaraderie with my fellow woodies.

Do you have any other interests apart from woodturning?

The company of the grandchildren and participating in the various landcare projects at the Moss Vale Golf Club.
