Treasurer's Report

We finished the month of March with a balance of \$4,604.91 which is a significant improvement on the results of recent months.

The BBQ at Bunnings on 6 March yielded a profit of \$262 and Moss Vale Show and other commissions brought in \$102.55. Payments included \$134.95 for electricity, plus the catchup of expenses (and income) from the previous month.

With the addition of more Equipment Levies of \$525 and BBQ profit of \$262 the Equipment Fund has increased to \$2,153.09 and the balance of general funds stands at \$2,451.82. We will be doing a review of the accounts and the budget at the Committee meeting and will tell you about this on Saturday 24 but it all seems reasonably bright now.

Mike's Design Session

On 28 March we had our regular, 4-yearly, design workshop. Mike first introduced the design process, discussed some points on mouldings, and how to set out design drawings. Members were then asked to design a watch stand, a back-scratcher, and a caster. Mike then reviewed the drawings.

What stood out was that those who produced clear, well-finished designs in the workshop were in general those whose own turnings were better designed. A significant proportion of members have yet to master clearly drawing out the design ideas that they generate, not through lack of ability, but because they believe that they can design well while turning.

A Woodturning Woodie in 20 Quick Questions

Woodturner in question Lou Sackett

Place of birth? I was born at Lewes In Sussex in Old Mother England. I left there and came to Australia in 1966. Rita and I were married On Saturday the 6th of March, honeymooned on the Sunday and arrived in Sydney on Tuesday the 8th of March. We took up residence in Dulwich Hill.

Now residing? I retired in 2003 and Rita and I moved from Sydney up to the delightful Southern Highlands to lovely lovely Braemar.

Occupation now or in previous life? When I retired I was working in the chemical engineering field. All up, I worked in the chemical industry for a total of 33 years with the three Sydney firms, Maxwell Chemical, ANCO and Ondao-Nalco.

Before making the career change to Chemeng I was a dusty Stonemason. I learnt my trade in London and I was ticketed in London. In the U.K. Stonemasons are allied with Landscape Gardeners. Not all of us work on headstones. My first employment in Australia was as a Slate Mason and a Stone Mason with Slate Industries in North Sydney. I was with them for a total of three years before branching out on my own as a Stone Mason. After three years of self-employment I spent the next two years with Associated Stone Masons and Quarries before moving on to Chemical Engineering.

Interest in turning began when/how? My initial introduction to woodturning came while I was at school. I never really had the opportunity to take it up again after leaving school until one day in 2007, I met Bill Dinning at the Men's Shed in Bowral, one thing led to another and here I am. So you see it's all Bill Dinnings fault.

Have you had any turning tuition? Yes I have. I spent two weekends with Bill Shean in Bargo.

Do you have a workshop or area as such? Sure do. I have a good sized workshop. A 7m x 6m colour bond shed that is insulated and lined and fitted with a dust extraction system.

Do you have a lathe? The ubiquitous MC900 that I picked up at the Bowral Toolbox for a very good price, after bit of haggling and a lot of patience.

What other machinery do you have? One side of my shed is dedicated to working with metal and the other for working wood. There is a thicknesser, a jointer, sander, pedestal drill welders, air compressor as well as all the other small hand and power tools found in workshops. My benches and all the heavy machinery are mounted on wheels

which makes it very easy for my back.

Preferred turning tool?

The Bowl Gouge and the Skew.



Favourite turning timber? I don't have a favourite timber as such and I am still trying all the various species I can get. I find that each different timber provides for a different challenge.

Preferred Finish? Triple EEE and Shellac. I also prefer the project to be still in one piece when I apply the finish. I seem to have this penchant for turning through the bottoms.

Has your turning been influenced by anything/body?

Other turners completed work.

Do you have a preference in turning i.e. bowls spindle etc.? Bowls. Definitely.

Do you have a favourite piece that you have made?

There is no favourite piece as such, however having said that there are some that gave me a lot of satisfaction after turning and if I like a piece I tend to give it away to someone I like.

What has been your most difficult/intricate/failed piece? Several early pieces. Like I said earlier, remembering to stop before I reached the chuck.

Is there any particular aspect of your turning you would like to improve? Applying the finish.

Is there any particular project that you wish to accomplish at some time? Not yet, but I would like to be able to turn well.

What do you like and\or dislike about woodturning? The cleaning up.

Is there a particular benefit you feel you have gained from the craft? Pleasure and self-satisfaction I get from completing a turning.

Do you have any other interests apart from woodturn-ing? Word work in general and gardening.
