Col Hayman showed us how he made his lovely little pine balls that he displayed at a meeting

last year. He says it is a simple process, start with a cylinder, mark of a length the same length as the cylinder width and then turn away the corners.

Finally, mount it between two centres and cut away the original holding points. See, simple!!

John Harris then took over with his bells. Which are goblets without stems. He showed off initially by roughing down his blank with the skew chisel, something every one does quite naturally. He took us through the steps of the initial mounting, roughing, tenon either end and remount. Shape the bottom, shape main body and then hollow. John uses the Richard Raffan back hollowing method which really clears end grain material out quickly.





John then showed us his tools for making balls, sharpened metal tubes of various diameters, which turn a ball of that specific diameter. They worked quickly and efficiently and are obviously not a financial drain on the pocket. Well done John!

Overall, a varied and interesting meeting. Congratulations to demonstrators, the cooks and all those who attended.

Both of these annual events are fast approaching. This is an opportunity to seel some of your work as well as put our faces in front of the Community.

When submitting goods for sale, please make sure that you:

- 1. Put a label on every piece.
- 2. The label should include your code, eg RC for Richard Cranium, a unique number for that article.
- 3. The price.

You also need to produce a list of all your goods showing the Code and Number and price that is on the label plus a short description of the item, eg Bowl, Camphor, Liberon finish (you can tell this must be Freddie's). So that if the label is misplaced, the guys on duty can still work out whose it is and what price you want.
