

He explained the three different axes on which timber moves, along the length of the timber, around the circumference of the timber and axially from the centre to the edge, and that the differences in rates of movement are what cause splits and shakes.

Arts Trail 2011


The Arts Trail is now only two weeks away. We will be hosting on the weekends of 5/6th & 12/13th No-vember.


