WELCOME TO THE

SYDNEY WOODTURNERS GUILD Inc.

Welcome to the Sydney Woodturners Guild and I hope that your membership of the Guild will be a long and mutually profitable association.

This little booklet has been prepared to answer many of the questions that many new members ask about the Guild and is intended to guide you through the early days of Guild membership.

What the Guild does for me and my Region/Club:

How the Guild contributes to you and your region or club.

Woodturning gear & merchandising:

A short directory where to get your equipment and materials.

MEMBERSHIP

Be advised that even though you have joined at one particular region you are a member of the Sydney Woodturners Guild (Inc.). This entitles you to attend any meeting or function of the Guild as a full member of the Guild with all the rights of that membership. This includes, but not limited to meetings of other regional groups. You will be welcomed at the meetings of other groups.

MEMBERSHIP FEES

The cost of renewal of membership fees is reviewed from time to time and is currently \$35 per year for the Guild. Regions/Clubs often add to this to help cover their own expenses. Membership fees fall due on the 1st July each year. You will be supplied with a renewal reminder form at your club.

Your region/club will organise the forwarding of The Guild membership fee and paperwork to the Guild Secretary, Treasurer and Membership Secretary. Your new membership card will then be forwarded to your region/club for you to pick up. . This membership card can be shown at some traders to obtain a discount on purchases.

You are a member of the Guild the moment you pay your fees and fill in the Membership Form even though you may not have a Guild membership number issued to you at this time.

If you joined after 1st April, you will not have to renew your membership until July the following year.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Aims and Aspirations:

The Aim of the Guild is:

- 1) To promote the craft of hand woodturning.
- 2) To bring together individuals interested in woodturning.
- 3) To exchange woodturning ideas and knowledge among members through such avenues as:- Discussions, Seminars, Demonstrations, Recurring education and Competitions.
- 4) To encourage interest in woodturning through the display of woodturned articles at exhibitions, shows, fairs etc.
- 5) To inform members of availability of turning timbers and associated items, where possible arrange purchase at prices advantageous to members.
- 6) To seek a progressive influence on the design and techniques of woodturning.
- 7) To provide an environment for members to interact in such a way so as to avoid social isolation and develop new friendships.

STRUCTURE OF THE GUILD

The first formal meeting of the Sydney Woodturners Guild was held at the Woodturning Centre of the Sydney Technical College, Ultimo, on the 4th July 1983.

The emblem and creed were devised at that time to indicate that a "skilled hand" in conjunction with "a good eye" will be required to execute the shape

and form of the turned object as per the design or a variation thereof. It also reminds us that the final appearance of the object has to be "pleasing to the eye".

The organisational structure of the Guild roughly follows the guidelines as laid down in the model rules for organisations. These basic rules were adopted when the Guild incorporated on 8th February 1989. The Guild's Objectives and Rules are described in detail in our Constitution updated 2nd November 2009.

The Guild consists of a number of regions/clubs, each being an incorporated entity in their own right forming part of the umbrella organisation known as The Sydney Woodturners Guild. Each region/club is allowed 3 representatives who attend the Guild Executive Meeting every 2 months. At these meetings, various matters concerning the Guild are discussed and voted on.

Any member of any region/club is welcome to attend the Executive Meetings, but only 1 person from each region/club is permitted to vote. This is so that no one region/club can dominate the operation of the Guild. All Regions/Clubs are equal.

Page 2 of the "By Hand & Eye" newsletter lists the current contact details of your representative.

The Executive

The Guild is an Incorporated entity and is required to have elections for Guild Officers at a General Election each year. The President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary are elected at the Annual General Meeting held in September each year.

A nomination form is usually provided with the June/July newsletter.

Regional/Club Representatives

The other members of the Executive Committee are the representatives. Each region/club of the Guild has up to 3 representatives on the committee. These representatives are nominated and elected by the membership at the

region/club meetings. Communication to and from the committee is via your representative.

The representative should be communicating to you the decisions and determinations of the Executive Committee. Your concerns should also be passed to the committee via your representative. It is your responsibility as a member of the Sydney Woodturners Guild to support your representative and ensure that they represent your interests to the committee.

Regional/Club Convenors/Presidents

These are elected by the membership at the AGM of the region/club. They control and co-ordinate the conduct of the meetings. They are important members of a region/club and always have a lot to do. They may require help in the conduct of their duties and should be able to count on all members for support.

Other Regional/Club Officers

The regions/clubs determine what other officers they need to assist the regional/club convenor/president in the discharge of his/her duties. A Treasurer, Secretary and Public Officer is suggested.

You, the members

Your job is to treat all other members with respect and friendship and to provide support to others and especially new Guild members and particularly those who have been elected to office. You will also find that participation in Guild functions has its rewards.

Committee Appointments

These people include the Public Officer, Newsletter Editor, Special Events Co-Ordinator and Membership Secretary. They are invited to Committee Meetings and although they have a voice they are not elected and therefore have no vote in the determination of the Committee.

Why should I attend an Executive Meeting?

The Executive Meetings are held on the last Monday of every second month, i.e. January, March, May, July, September (AGM), and November. Meetings are held at the Girl Guide Hall, 157 Waldron Street, Chester Hill. 2162. Meetings start at 6:30PM, (1830) and are generally finished by 9PM, (2100) at the latest.

You should attend at least once to see how the Guild Executive functions and to meet representatives from the other regions/clubs.

WHAT THE GUILD DOES FOR ME AND MY REGION/CLUB.

Membership: The Membership Secretary maintains the Guild and the Clubs' current membership. Membership numbers from the Guild are NOT reissued. Therefore, for example membership number 1 is not held by the oldest member, or the Guild President. It is only held by the original owner.

Insurance: The Guild by using the power of numbers ensures that members and Regions/Clubs get the best possible deal for insurance. Each year clubs or individuals say that they can get insurance cheaper. The Guild Secretary ALWAYS checks to ensure that we are getting the best deal possible. We usually find that we can get cheaper insurance, but you have to give something up, e.g. "Uninvited Guest Cover". This covers you if a thief breaks into your region/club to steal from you. They then injure themselves and sue you for leaving dangerous equipment around. Or you have to give up cover for carrying large amounts of cash from a market day, BBQ or other fund raiser etc. Or you have to give up Public Liability cover, it is assumed that no one wants to take that risk.

Region/Club Promotion: The Guild through the Royal Easter Show and The Timber and Working with Wood Show promotes ALL the regions/clubs. Anyone coming to the demonstrations and showing an interest in joining, or wanting to "give woodturning a go" is given a flyer and directed to the most appropriate club for the area that they live in. If a member of that club is present they are introduced, so they have a personal contact. We have the

Guild Events Coordinator to thank for these activities. Members also benefit from discounted entry tickets to some shows.

Also under this section are Web Services. A number of clubs have their own website, but the Guild also promotes the Clubs through its own website. Indeed clubs are welcome to have their own space on the Guild website. Our Web Administrator has made this offer a number of times.

Most recently promotion; has taken a new turn with Bankstown, Northern Beaches and Eastern Region trying out the offer of the Hobby Society. Bankstown report very good results. They also report that they redirect possible members to the club nearest to them if they wish to join the Guild.

Training: Regions/Clubs run their own woodturning courses. The Guild offers free to the Regions/Clubs "Train the Trainer" courses. These courses are run on an "as needed" basis and have been very well received.

Sale of Excess Product: The Guild through The Timber and Working with Wood Show enables members to sell their excess product. The Guild does take a small percentage, but the Guild has to pay for the space, electricity, truck etc. Profit for this is not our main objective, please remember that most of the membership you pay goes to insurance.

Promoting the Craft of Woodturning: This involves the Easter Show, where the Guild offers prizes in a number of categories devoted to woodturning and also contributes to the judging of turned artefacts. It also comes into the area of the Timber and Working with Wood Show where the incredible products of our members are on display and sale.

Promotion is also via the Web Services, the Newsletter, Art/Craft markets and some other areas.

Newsletter: Better known as the By Hand & Eye (BH&E).

In addition to the BH&E, I know that a number of clubs have their own newsletter/club magazine. This allows members to know what is happening within their own club. BH&E allows members to know what is happening in other parts of the Guild.

I would like to finish by saying that you should remember it is YOUR Guild, and you will only get out of it what you put into it. The volunteers are there to help and facilitate, but in the final analysis it is up to YOU to make it work.

REGIONAL/CLUB MEETINGS

The real strength of the Guild is in the Regional/Club meetings. This is a short list of the regions/clubs as a point of introduction. Being a member of the Sydney Woodturners Guild you are entitled to attend any meeting on the calendar of any region/club.

Bankstown Region

Bankstown has their shed open on the 1st and 3rd Saturday of each month from 0800 to 1430 approximately. They meet at the Girl Guide Hall, 157 Waldron Street, Chester Hill. 2162.

Southern Highlands Region

Their shed is in the grounds of Harbison Aged Care's facility 2 Charlotte Street, Burradoo, NSW. 2576.

The shed is open Tuesday 0900 to 1230, Friday 0900 to 1230 and Saturday 0900 to finish. The group holds their monthly meeting on 4^{th} Saturday of the month from 1100 to 1630.

Sydney Northern Beaches Woodturners

The club is located at the Narrabeen RSL Club, 116 Nareen Parade, North Narrabeen, 2101. The workshop is at the lower front section of the building and is available to members daily.

Tuesday, Friday and Saturday sessions are set aside for learning, training, guidance and toy making. Open 0900.

Meetings and Demonstrations are held on the third Sunday of each month.

Menai Region Woodturners

Currently Menai Region meets at 2 locations. Firstly at Menai High School Wood room at 40 Gerald Road, Illawong, 2234, from 1800 to 2100 on the 2nd Tuesday of each month. Secondly at the Men's Shed at Barden Ridge, 30 Recreation Drive, Barden Ridge, 2234 (100 metres down on right from Golf Driving Range) from 1730 to 2030 on 4th Tuesday of the month.

There is no charge for Guild Member visitors.

Eastern Region

Eastern Region shed is at 169 Bilga Crescent, Malabar. 2036. The shed is open each Friday 1000 to 1400, and each Saturday from 1000 to 1600. These times can be extended if necessary.

The group holds their monthly meeting with a BBQ and Show and Tell on the first Sunday of the month from 1000. Cost is \$5 per person.
