

The importance of exercise and how it affects our well being and mental health is often forgotten in these days when our lives are run to timetables dictated by medical appointments, medication and meal times. It is vital to take your heart and lungs out for exercise daily and it is even better if you do it whilst you do something fun and interesting. Talk to your doctor and/or your physiotherapist as to what exercise suits you best.

#### Regular exercise will help to:

- Improve your ability to do activities needed for everyday tasks;
- Reduce breathlessness;
- Improve arm, body and leg muscle strength;
- Clear mucus (or sputum, phlegm) from your chest;
- Improve balance;
- Improve mood and make you feel in control;
- Make you independent;
- Assist weight control;
- Improve bone density;
- Reduce the need for hospital admissions.



• Before any exercise talk to your doctor to ensure you are medically clear to exercise;

• Aim to exercise for minimum 30 minutes, 5 times a week. It is important to note that the 30 minutes does not need to be done in 1 continuous session if you can't achieve it, but a total of 30 minutes is the target. Always exercise in a safe and friendly environment and select a suitable exercise programme

- · If exercising outdoors, DON'T FORGET your hat and sunscreen
- Take breaks (rest) and rehydrate (drink water) whilst exercising
- Exercise can be in the home, such as:

heel-to-toe, walking on the spot, step-up-and-down (stairs), walking sideways, sit and stand from a chair, balance on one leg using a bench to hang on to if necessary, Walking a straight line heel to toe.

• Weight exercises can be done using 2 shopping bags with identical weight tins in them.






