Please Note only online entrys are available from now on. The process is a bit convoluted.

First get onto the Easter Show website <u>www.eastershow.com.au</u>, click on Competitions (top of the screen).

Scroll down to "Arts and Crafts" and click on it, and scroll down to enter here, and click on it.

You then may need to create an account, (if you have not done so before). Record your username and password for next year.

You will receive a confirmation email with a link. Click on the link.

You will then have to create an Exhibitor entry and you can then enter your item and pay the \$15 entry fee for your item.



FROM THE HISTORY FILES

GETTING TO THE POINT

George Hatfield

In Ernie Newman's reflections of his USA trip (By Hand & Eye Vol 4.95) he states there are a number of Woodturners in the States who use the cutting section of a skew chisel above the short point to turn beads. He also stated Bonnie Klien, (a well known woodturner and a really nice person) claims that it was the only logical way to turn a bead.

My first thought after reading this proclamation was, are they really turning a bead? Or are they only turning a flat convex shape. A true bead is a semi-circular shape with sides that finish vertical. It has been my experience when turning the final part of a bead (from 2 to 3 o'clock or 10 to 9 o'clock) the cut must be on the short point, if not you will lose control and have that dreaded "dig-in". I have lived long enough to learn that nothing is impossible.

I have seen a turner who is now living in WA turn a true semi circular hollow solely with a skew chisel, however I can assure you he has had years of turning experience and turns the hollow very slowly using only minute cuts and still has the occasional run back, but it is only a party trick.

When he is doing serious turning he uses a detail gouge like everybody else.

The point I am making is that it may be possible but if you are going to try to turn a bead off the short point I suggest you first work on your biceps to build up your muscle power and have plenty of timber to practice on, and once (or if) you perfect the technique I still wouldn't advise you using that technique on expensive timber. I'm afraid I have to disagree with Bonnie Klien when she says "it is the only logical way to turn a bead".

In the same article the Ed, quoted me as saying "on large beads you do not use the short point of the skew".

I'm afraid he misunderstood what I said. What I said was "when turning large beads or ball shapes it is better to start with the chisel at about 60 degrees to the axis and start the cut just up from the short point, this will allow you to put your body-weight behind the cut giving you more control but as you approach the vertical section of the bead you drop the handle slightly which will move the cutting section of the skew to the short point then when the shape is finished, keeping the cutting edge in the cut lift the handle to tuck in the shape".

Now that we have the use of a closed circuit TV system in the woodturning section at the College I suggest we could use it at our next meeting to really analyse how a skew chisel is used to turn a bead.

From the Ed. While I have a copy of BH&E referred to in the article above I cannot find anything by Ernie Newman, sorry.

PRODUCT REVIEW.

GORILLA GLUE.

I should start this by saying that the way this came about was one of the members at Eastern Region contacted me during the last lock down and suggested that I try Gorilla Glue, "available from Bunnings and cheaper than Titebond", (which I have been using since I started turning).

So, for the last several months I have been trying it out in various applications. These have included laminating woods, interior and exterior applications. They say it will bond with everything, Wood, Stone, Metal, Ceramic, Foam, Glass and more.

The procedure for use is simple, firstly dampen both surfaces to be bonded, secondly spread a thin layer of glue over one surface, and finally clamp for 1 to 2 hours. I have to say it works certainly on timber just as they say it will.

I have found that the bond is very strong and while I have had to clamp Titebond for anything up to 12 hours, Gorilla Glue can go off in as little as half and hour. It does ooze out from the joint and forms what looks like yellow foam. This is easily removed with a flat chisel, as it sets to a blob on the surface.

I made a letterbox for one of the ladies at Kooloora and used Gorilla Glue because of its weather proof properties. I do not think the joints will ever come apart, and once you remove the yellow foam material, the joint seems to be almost invisible.

Costs, Gorilla Glue (236ml) available from Bunnings \$19.90, Titebond III Ultimate Wood glue (237ml) available from Carbatec \$13. Well, it is not cheaper than Titebond, however like all these things, depending on the application it could be a good option, particularly if you want fast gluing times and a weather proof glue.

I would recommend the use of disposable gloves when using this product. Also I would not use it on any item that you intend to put food into. I am not sure of the chemistry involved with it.


When I received my second dose of Astra-Zeneca vaccine my GP made the following comment to me.



QUIZ ANSWERS

FEBRUARY 92 QUIZ ANSWERS

- 1. Slip a ferrule over the pin and file notches in it to receive the prongs of the driving centre. Remove when turning is completed. Alternatively a timber block could be drilled to slip over the pin or the pin could be held in a jacobs chuck.
- 2. Cheesewood. When seasoned the others all weigh over one tonne per cubic metre. This is heavier than water.
- 3. Sandpaper.
- 4. 10-15%. Moisture content varies slightly with the seasons but in Sydney it ranges from 14-15% and is usually about 12% indoors. It is lower in air conditioned buildings.
- 5. Cabriole legs. The first centre mark in the foot of a cab leg is usually turned away when the job is mounted on the second centre. It would take a lot of trial and error to determine it's exact position so it is quicker to turn four new legs.
