MARCH MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT.



"All we have to fear is fear itself"

Franklin D Roosevelt inauguration speech 1933.

The Story of the Humble Clamp

From Timbecon Advertising 15/10/21

What can you say about clamping? Clamps are just clamps, right? I don't think so! Clamping / holding your work is one of the most fundamental processes for the woodworker. Think of a single session in your workshop when you haven't reached for some sort of clamp or work holding device. And how many times have you thought – "hmmm, I wish I had a clamp that would do that." Not convinced? let's briefly review the story of the humble clamp.

Gluing up

Gluing Up. This is the most obvious, supercritical and dynamic step in the woodworking process. It's the cool part because it means you are getting closer to actually building a thing. It's also a time when you need to have plenty of clamps that work and are ready to go in case things get ugly. Somehow it never seems to go together the same way as in the dry run.

Holding your job on a work surface

Imagine if you could never pin stuff to the bench flat again. This is the stuff of nightmares! Whether you want to belt sand an edge, rout a profile, take a blow with the number 7 or clean out a trench, being able to hold work securely down on the bench is more than a must-have.

Holding your job in a vice

Want to hold something at just the right height and on an angle. A rock-solid bench vice is what you need. They come in many forms both for wood and metal. Usually, you need three. Yes, three. One for metal, one for the day to day and one to crack bush nuts.

Holding your job in a jig

And for the riskiest tasks of all. Clamps for holding your job in a jig. In a certain way as you present it to the spinning blade. It must not slip, it must let go, it must also be super easy to move and refix. You can burn a lot of time on jigs if you don't have the right clamping kit available.

FROM THE HISTORY FILES

DO IT THE WAY YOU LIKE IT.

When I was a little boy, fifty years ago, my family lived in a flat in a three story building in Baghdad, Iraq. The ground level of that building was variety of shops ranging from small grocery to car smash repairing. An open fronted shop was occupied by a cabinet maker, where I spent a lot of time standing in front of the shop watching him and his brother, with deep interest, doing their woodwork. His brother was specialized in turning table and chair legs.

The lathe was very primitive and made entirely of timber except its two dead centers. To operate it, the woodturner used to drop it flatly on the ground without a stand. He had to sit on his buttocks on the ground and he had to be bare footed. He had to use all his limbs at the same time to do turning. He laid his right foot over the lathe to prevent it from moving and rested the left one on the tool rest squeezing a tool between two of his toes to shift it left and right, so it worked like car screen wipers. And that was why he had to be bare footed. With his left hand he controlled the skew, which was his only tool. With his last limb, the right hand, he pulled a bow forward and backward to turn the timber by a string tied to its ends and twisted around the turning object. With all that complicated operation I was amazed by his art and production speed. At that age and time I thought that was the only way to turn wood, until the master bought his brother a modern electric lathe to lift some burden off his brother.

But the unexpected happened. The first time that woodturner used the new lathe was the last time as well. Simply because he could not handle it. He kept turning in his own way leaving the modern lathe untouched collecting layer after layer of dust.

This story could be a source of laughter but at the same time could be a reminder for some of us about what happens when we change onto a high technology machine.

So do it the way you like it, as long as it gives you the same result. When I asked that man, fifty years ago, why he stopped using the new lathe, he said " that's the way I like it". Sam Shakouri

SLEEP DISORDERS

(Extracted from 13th Edition of "Information Booklet" by Sleep Disorders Australia)

EXCESSIVE DAYTIME SLEEPINESS has a significant impact on quality of life. People with daytime sleepiness struggle with social, academic and work demands, they are at risk of motor vehicle and workplace accidents and generally have poorer health than comparable adults.

Accurate diagnosis is important, not only because of the negative impacts of sleepiness and its root causes on health and social function but because excessive sleepiness is generally remediable with appropriate treatment. See your doctor for help.

SLEEP APNEA occurs when the airway in the throat collapses during sleep reducing airflow or completely blocking the airway. This disrupts sleep and reduces oxygen supply to vital organs. Severe sleep apnea affects about 5% of adults. Fortunately, effective treatment is available and once treated the person with sleep apnea can lead a normal healthy life.

In many people sleep apnea results from being overweight. If this is the case, losing weight may help or even cure the apnea (as well as reducing the risk of cardiovascular disease, high blood pressure and diabetes). Seek medical advice from your doctor.

INSOMINA is a common and distressing difficulty in falling asleep, going back to sleep, or waking too early.

There are many different causes of insomnia. Some medical conditions may cause insomnia, particularly pain chronic respiratory problems, or other sleep disorders. Some medications such as blood pressure tablets or asthma medication, as well as substances like caffeine, nicotine and alcohol may trigger insomnia or make it worse. Psychiatric conditions such as depression and anxiety are common in causing insomnia. Other precipitating factors such as illness, loss, death of a family member/friend, financial stresses, work and relationship issues may be factors. Even when these triggers are no longer present, or reduced at least to some extent, the insomnia can continue. Insomnia can be a vicious cycle, in that the more you worry about not sleeping, the harder it is to get to sleep.

Just as there are many causes for insomnia, there are many treatments, but in most people the insomnia will get better by itself. If it persists, ask your doctor for a referral to a psychologist, a certain number of sessions with a sleep psychologist are subsidised by Medicare.

- Reduce the time you spend in bed instead of compensating for poor sleep by giving yourself more time to fall asleep or go back to sleep, because that behaviour leads to even worse sleep. Keeping the same getting up time will help re-set your brain clock.
- Get up and go to another room if you are unable to go to sleep or go back to sleep within about 15 minutes. Read or listen to music in a dim light, and when feeling less tense and more comfortable, go back to bed and "let yourself go". You MAY need to do this a number of times a night until you get your sleep back into a better pattern
- If there is an underlying medical condition that is contributing to the insomnia, get help from your doctor.

NARCOLEPSY is an uncommon but very debilitating neurological sleep disorder characterised by a combination of symptoms, differing in the combination and severity, but generally:

- Drowsiness during the day, tiredness, lack of energy, exhaustion, or a combination of these either continuously or at various times throughout the day. Sometimes sleepiness occurs so suddenly and with such overwhelming power that it is referred to as a "sleep attack" which may be as short as a minute or as long as an hour. The sufferer wakes up refreshed and be alert.
- Cataplexy which is the sudden loss of muscle function which can be as severe as a collapse, or just a weakness in the knees, jaw or facial muscle, droop or possibly inability to speak clearly

There is no cure for narcolepsy but some symptoms can be managed with medicines and lifestyle changes. Seek medical advice urgently before you have or cause an accident.

Including: 3pcs 8" fabric buffing wheels 1pc Tripoli bar, 1pc White diamond bar, 1pc Carnuba wax bar. 1pc MT.2 heavy duty lathe mandrel which holds the buffing wheels. The system requires a lathe with a minimum of 1/2HP. It is recommended that the final piece be pre-treated with Danish Oil.

Tony Vidler: Tony showed examples of his skill with a Vermec Sphere Jig. The spheres were made from an assortment of hardwoods. When perfectly balanced and true, the spheres are capable of simultaneous rotation on the surface of a turned "collection "plate.





Jenny Talbot: Jenny explained her challenges when turning this winged bowl. The wood was unknown, but consensus was that it may be Teak.





Tim MacGregor: This small Rosewood bowl is finished in "Aussie Oil". Tim commented on the way the polish converts "like magic" the pale colour of the raw timber into the rich reddish finish of the Rosewood.





Barry Brown: We have heard a lot, in recent weeks, about "RATS" however not this rather attractive Banksia cone specimen. In keeping with the Banksia theme, Barry also displayed his recent Valentine's Day gift for Gai, complete with a ubiquitous red rose.





Meg Webster: Expertise in all things petite keeps being demonstrated! This miniature bird house complete with feathered inhabitant is accompanied by a miniature hardwood duck.



Gorgi Armen: "When ingenuity is needed Gorgi always has the most practical answer". Gorgi described in detail how this large Jacaranda Urn was turned and hollowed. The external grooves on the body of the Urn were in perfect alignment to those on the lid he explained how he used High Speed Steel Forstner woodworking boring wood hole saw cutter drill bit for the initial hollowing.





Alex Bendeli: Made from a red gum burl initially hollowed by a small chain saw blade and spectacularly finished in multi (5) coats of British Paint Clear Gloss. Note the "step insert" for effect around the top edge. Alex also showed his "platform" to hold items for spray finishing as well as some 'Paint Pyramids" used to support objects when spray painting.

Due to unforeseen circumstances Catherine's chainsaw will not be available to the group. The meeting approved the purchase of a small electric chainsaw.

Water leaking into the shed continues to be a problem and with the continued heavy rain over the last couple of months the problem is getting worse. It was decided to appoint a person to oversee the maintenance of clearing out the roof and ground gutters. Mario Dato volunteered to undertake this task.

QUIZ ANSWERS

- 1/ By lightly dragging a piece of rubber against it for a few seconds while it is spinning. An old rubber shoe sole will do.
- 2/ Very soft timbers.
- 3/ Sydney Blue Gum is not oily. Because the others are oily they may be difficult to laminate. If they are to be turned after gluing caution is advisable as the bond may be weak.
- 4/ A non revolving tailstock centre. It should be lubricated occasionally with wax (candle wax is fine). Otherwise friction may cause the timber to char or even work loose and fly out of the lathe.
- 5/ When cutting right down to the tailstock centre. A revolving centre is much more likely to damage the point of the tool than a stationary centre.
