So, I think that the Membership Fee charged by the Guild is very reasonable.

I hope that this has helped to put the fees into perspective.

Finally, I want to say that I am happy to serve as President of The Sydney Woodturners Guild for another year. I hope to see you all in the not too distant future.

Also, I want to remind you that entries for the 2023 Royal Easter Show open in December. I hope you all will consider entering something into the show. Remember it is online entries only now.

VALE GRAHAM TILLY (MEMBER NUMBER 47)

25 MAY 1930 - 3 NOVEMBER 2022

REPRINT FROM PORTRAIT OF A WOODTURNER by Jim Dorbis September 2002

A few years ago I was kindly asked by the management of Prince Henry Hospital at Little Bay to help some schizophrenic youths... It was a challenge for me. I was to teach them basic woodturning for therapeutic reasons. I was there for six months. However, for one reason or another I had to find a preplacement for a few days. Who offered to help? My friend and member of the Guild: GRAHAM TILLY. As his wife was using the family car to go to work he was forced to change three busses each way. It was an effort. But such is this man – ready to help at all times – and he still does this in different ways.

Graham was born at Murraybridge (South Australia), is 72 years old, (passed away at 92 years old), married and has three children and seven grandchildren. He started work as a maths teacher in S.A. He taught in secondary schools for 10 years. After a stint of one year in the USA he returned as a maths lecturer at Sydney University until his retirement.

Graham was always interested in wood. He followed the TAFE Course at the old address (Bijou Lane) in the city. During his spare time, (usually lunch time), he was always in the school workshop playing with the wood lathes and it became second nature. His lathe is a "mongrel lathe" as he calls it, made by using different pieces from everywhere. In one word, a Multicultural lathe. But it works and I have even turned on it.

Graham joined the Guild in 1983 (No 47). He was at the first meeting and been a member since. Besides woodturning he practices Wood Carving which, by the way, has surpassed woodturning as his hobby. Let's put it this way, when he tires of sitting down he stands up in front of his lathe and visa versa. He also specializes in making wooden boxes (exquisite ones) and woodwork in general. He also loves making spheres and carves them. One way Graham says improves his woodturning is by doing short production runs (like turning 10 bowls in one go) and improving on each one. Well...that is his theory. He loves going to the special woodturning courses like Woodturn 2002. You always learn a lot he says.

Speaking of our Guild, he loves it. It is alive and well he says and with its satellite groups (Regions) it is great and advancing. The drawback (if we can refer to it by this name) is the age of the members of the Guild. So, we must endeavour to attract younger members at all times. Graham's aspirations are to make deep vessels. At the age of 25 he started making Chess pieces, well, he still aspires at making the other 30 (32 in all).

Our Guild is a few years old now and we think it is on the map. If we keep going the way we do with zeal and enthusiasm it will progress further. It is a constant effort. Graham hates having shavings in his neck and tries to avoid long sanding sessions (ha ha ha). As far as getting comments at home for carrying sawdust he says he is selectively deaf. Good point...aren't we all?

Although a fairly experienced woodturner, Graham has had fun on the lathe; like being hit on the back of the head by an exploding bowl... just as he thought he was putting the finishing touch. How did it reach that point?? By hitting the ceiling and bouncing back. And other little accidents, it was fun he says.

Dear Graham.....you are a steady but unreliable member of our Eastern Region. However, your door is always open to us and for that we thank you. You are of great help when needed.

UPDATE and PERSONAL NOTE: Some years ago Graham was given Life Membership of Eastern Region. Something he did not request or want. He fought against it each year at the group AGM. The group would not be swayed, so he would ungraciously accept the situation. He supported the group when it was decided to move into the shed at Bilga Crescent Malabar.

On a personal note I remember two incidents with Graham which had a profound impact on my turning.

Firstly, in the early days of being with the group, maybe I was looking for some form of validation, I commented to Graham that "I was not a great woodturner." Graham's comment was to ask me "Was I having fun?" I answered "Yes, and that I occasionally turned out a really nice piece". His reply was: "That is all that is required, just have fun". This has guided my turning and my philosophy when passing on what little skill I have to others.

Secondly, I was having trouble turning bowls. They would bang and thump and threaten to jump off the lathe. It was scaring me to the point of giving up on bowl turning. Graham offered to take me under his wing at his home and "sort me out". A regrind of my bowl gouge to a different shape and a couple of "like this, do that" sessions and I was away with no problems. Mind you I loved his Bowl Gouge. It was the biggest lump of steel I had ever held up to that point. I own one like it now.

Graham was a great friend of the Guild, Eastern Region and personally. I shall miss him a great deal. I hope that they have wood and a lathe where he is. R.I.P. friend.

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FROM THE HISTORY FILES

Wartime Ingenuity by Ernie Newman BH&E November 1991.

During World War Two many manufacturers turned their factories over to war production, so it became difficult to replace or repair some products.

Keith Webb, a friend of my fathers, found it was impossible to get a replacement piston for his motor bike. As he explained to my father, the solution was both simple and cheap. Using a metal lathe he turned up a piston from wood.

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SCAMS – MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES Part 2.

Over the next few issues I intend to highlight some of the more common scams that are around and that trap people. I must say that if you think you are the victim of a scam contact the authorities IMMEDIATELY.

This information is taken from "The Little Black Book of Scams" put out by The Australian Competition & Consumer Commission.

Every year, scams cost Australians, businesses and the economy hundreds of millions of dollars and cause emotional harm to victims and their families.

To stay one step ahead of scammers, learn more by visiting the ACCC,s Scamwatch website – www.scamwatch.gov.au – where you can sign up for free alerts on new scams targeting consumers and small businesses. You can also follow Scamwatch on Twitter at @scamwatch_gov or http://twitter.com/scamwatch_gov.

Firstly everyone is vulnerable to scams, so everyone needs information about how to identify and avoid being scammed. Some people think that only the gullible and greedy fall victim to scams. The truth is scammers are clever and if you don't know what to look out for, anyone can fall victim to a scam.

Investment scams

"Risk-free investment" or opportunity for misfortune?

How the scam works.

Investment scams come in many forms including business ventures, superannuation schemes, managed funds and the sale or purchase of shares or property. Scammers dress up "opportunities" with professional looking brochures and websites to mask their fraudulent operations. They often begin with a phone call or email out of the blue from a scammer offering a "not-to-be-missed", "high return" or "guaranteed" opportunity. The scammer usually operates from overseas, and will not have an Australian Financial Services licence.

Computer prediction software scams promise to accurately predict stock market movements, the results of horse races, sports events or lotteries. They are simply a form of gambling disguised as investments. Most of the schemes or programs do not work and buyers cannot get their money back. In many cases the supplier simply disappears.

Superannuation scams offer to give you early access to your super fund, often through a self - managed super fund or for a fee. The scammer may ask you to agree to a story to allow the early release of your money and then, acting as your financial advisor, they will deceive your superannuation company into paying out your super benefits directly to them. Once they have your money, the scammer may take large "fees" or leave you with nothing at all.

Protect yourself

- Don't let anyone pressure you into making decisions about your money or investments-especially if the offer has come out of the blue.
- Before parting with your money, do your own research on the investment company and check out
 <u>www.moneysmart.gov.au</u> to see if they have an Australian Financial Services Licence. Ask yourself;
 if a stranger knew a secret to making money, why would they share it?

If you are under retirement age, watch out for offers promoting easy access to your preserved superannuation benefits. If you illegally access your super early, you may face penalties under taxation law.

Including: 3pcs 8" fabric buffing wheels 1pc Tripoli bar, 1pc White diamond bar, 1pc Carnuba wax bar. 1pc MT.2 heavy duty lathe mandrel which holds the buffing wheels. The system requires a lathe with a minimum of 1/2HP. It is recommended that the final piece be pre-treated with Danish Oil.



Menai have a number of new members.


They will hold their AGM on 11 October.



Conclusion: The group continues to move forward this year.



"Is this a Tazza shown opposite? The dictionary definition of tazza is "a wine cup with a shallow bowl and a circular foot".

Google provides the following explanation "A tazza is a wide but shallow saucer-like dish either mounted on a stem and foot or on a foot alone. QUIZ ANSWERS

- 1/ Smooth Barked Apple. It is often riddled with defects and so is not used for structural purposes either. The other species are all recommended for turning flutes in Keith Bootle's book, Wood In Australia.
- 2/ Select a lower speed. Stabilise the lathe stand with weights. Anchor it to the floor and walls. Attach a counter balancing weight to the lighter side of the turning. The counter balance can be moved towards, or away from, the centre to vary it's effect. Alternatively, the weight of the counterbalance can be altered.
- 3/ The bearings may be damaged.
- 4/ So that the chisel doesn't catch in any nicks in the tool rest. Rounded edges are also more comfortable to handle.
- 5/ 1819. Thomas Blanchard of Philadelphia designed a copy lathe to produce rifle stocks.
