#### SCAMS – MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES Part 8.

If you think you are the victim of a scam contact the authorities IMMEDIATELY.

This information is taken from "The Little Black Book of Scams" put out by The Australian Competition & Consumer Commission.

Every year, scams cost Australians, businesses and the economy hundreds of millions of dollars and cause emotional harm to victims and their families.

To stay one step ahead of scammers, learn more by visiting the ACCC,s Scamwatch website – <a href="https://www.scamwatch.gov.au">www.scamwatch.gov.au</a> – where you can sign up for free alerts on new scams targeting consumers and small businesses. You can also follow Scamwatch on Twitter at @scamwatch\_gov or <a href="http://twitter.com/scamwatch\_gov">http://twitter.com/scamwatch\_gov</a>.

#### Charity and medical scams.

Scammers are heartless and can strike during desperate times of need.

#### How the Scam Works.

Scammers take advantage of people seeking to donate to a good cause or find an answer to a health problem.

**Charity scams** involve a scammers collecting money by pretending to work for a legitimate cause or charity, or a fictitious one they have created. Often scammers will exploit a recent natural disaster or crisis that has been in the news.

These scams divert much-needed donations away from legitimate charities. Charities must be registered with government-donate confidently by checking their registration first.

**Miracle cure** scams offer a range of products and services that can appear to be legitimate alternative medicines, usually promising quick and effective remedies for serious conditions. The treatments are often promoted using false testimonies from people who have been "cured".

**Weight loss scams** promise dramatic weight loss with little or no effort. This type of scam may involve an unusual or restrictive diet, revolutionary exercise, a "fat-busting" device, breakthrough pills. Patches or creams. You may be required to make a large advance payment or enter into a long-term contract to receive ongoing supplies.

**Fake online pharmacies** offer counterfeit drugs and medicine at very cheap prices, and sometimes provide them without a doctor's prescription. These drugs may have limited or no active ingredients, which can have lethal consequences for users.

#### **Protect yourself:**

- If you are approached by a charity street collector, ask to see their identification. If you have any doubts about who they are, do not pay.
- Check the Australian Charities Not for Profit Associations list of registered charities.
- Consult your healthcare professional if you are considering a "miracle" or "instant fix" claim about medicines, supplements or other treatments.
- Ask yourself: if this really is a miracle cure, wouldn't your healthcare professional have told you about it?





#### **AROUND THE REGIONS**

#### FROM THE GUILD.

The Guild meeting was held on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> September.

Your Guild currently has \$12,634.92 in the bank.

There are 230 members as of 24 September 2023. We have not yet returned to pre Covid numbers.

Many members would have received an email from Carbatec saying that they will no longer provide a discount on purchases. The Guild contacted Carbatec. I refer you to their advertising in By Hand and Eye. They will still give a discount to Guild Members upon you showing them your membership card.

The Guild will be demonstrating for 6 DAYS at the Easter Show next year. We will have a larger area than previously. We will also have more cabinet space. PLEASE LOOK IN YOUR STORAGE AREAS AT HOME, FIND A PIECE THAT YOU THINK IS PRETTY GOOD AND ENTER IT INTO THE SHOW.

The Timber Tools and Artisans Show is looking like going ahead in June, if they can organise the exhibitors. If it goes ahead it will probably be at Homebush.

**The AGM** was also held on 25 September 2023. Your Guild made an overall loss of \$1,085.92. This was mainly due to there being no Timber, Tools, and Artisans Show. There are no plans to increase fees at this time.

It was decided to change the Guild Constitution to allow the awarding of Life Memberships at any normal meeting, not just the AGM. There will also be guidelines to help in the decision process for determining if someone is worthy of Life Membership. Each Region/Club will receive a copy of the updated Constitution once it is done.

At the AGM on 25 September the Guild bestowed Life Memberships on Michael Twemlow (Region Representative) and Tony Ney.

The citations said:

**Michael (Mick) Twemlow** joined the Sydney Woodturners Guild in 2008. He has Membership Number 2613, and therefore has been a member for 15 years.

Michael lives at Ingleburn and does not drive. So, in order to go anywhere he depends on Public Transport, walks or occasionally gets a lift with a friend.

He has regularly visited various Regions/Clubs with suitcases full of timber that he has collected for them. He then uses public transport to deliver the collected timber to the Region/Club in question.

Michael has been a big part of the demonstrating team. Always there to set up and tear down the demonstration area at the various shows that the Guild attends.

Once the show starts, he is there at the beginning of each day and stays until the end of the day getting home late at night.

He is like an Energizer Bunny, he does not stop. He loves demonstrating to the public and the knowledge he passes on to them is a great reflection on himself and the Sydney Woodturners Guild.

Although he has not held a position on the executive committee, he has been a Guild Representative for his Region for many years. His willingness to leave home early and get home late shows a deep commitment to the Guild.

We wish we could clone him, it would make things easier.

**Tony Ney** joined the Sydney Woodturners Guild in 2004. He has Membership Number 2207, and therefore has been a member for 19 years. Tony took on the role of Vice President in 2013 and therefore has been the Vice President for 10 years.

Tony is a big part of the demonstration team. Always there to set up and tear down the demonstration area at the various shows that the Guild attends.

Once the show starts, he is often there at the beginning of each day and stays until the end of the day getting home late at night.

About three years ago he took on the role of Events Coordinator when David King felt he could no longer do it on his own. Tony loves demonstrating to the public and the knowledge he passes on to them is a great reflection on himself and the Sydney Woodturners Guild.

Tony has held the position of Vice President on the executive committee for 10 years, he has also been a Guild Representative for his region for many years.

Tony uses his own vehicle to transport Lathes, tables and other bits to and from the shows and activities that the Guild is involved with.

Earlier this year during a period when he had a Cancer scare he continued to work for the Guild to get us ready for the Royal Easter Show. This showed an extraordinary commitment to the Guild.

#### **ROYAL EASTER SHOW COMPETITION INFORMATION.**

**WOODWORK Maximum of one entry per Class.** THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS APPLY TO ALL WOODWORK CLASSES; ➤ Size: Maximum height 120cm. Each Exhibit must not occupy a base area larger than 165cm x 60cm. ➤ Exhibit must be able to be handled by one person. **Cost for Open Craft Classes is \$15 per entry.** 

**CLASS 285 - Wood Carving.** All disciplines. One article. Prize 1st \$50.

CLASS 286 - Wood Inlay and/or Marquetry. Not to be covered by glass or Perspex. One article. Prize 1st \$50.

**CLASS 287 - Platters/Bowls.** Any turned item which can be used as or resembles a platter or bowl. Item must NOT have a cover or lid and turned from one piece of timber, either solid or laminated but not segmented. The item can be embellished in any way, but the Judge must be satisfied that the piece shows 80% turning. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc. Prizes 1st \$80, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$20.

**CLASS 288 - Segmented Woodwork.** One article made up of numerous pieces of various timbers. These items can be vessels, bowls, platters, or any other wooden pieces, and the final shape shall be achieved by woodturning. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc. Prizes 1st \$80, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$20.

**CLASS 289 - Innovative.** Entries in this Class must be at least 80% turned, and be turnings which by design and/or construction are unique, and do not fit easily into any of the above categories. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc. Prizes 1st \$80, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$20.

**CLASS 290 - Novice Face plate turning.** Open to all wood turners who have not won a first, second or third prize in any Sydney Royal Easter show section of wood turning. The Exhibit must be turned with the grain of the timber at 90 degrees to the bed of the lathe. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc. Prizes 1st \$75, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$25.

**CLASS 291 - Novice Spindle turning.** Open to all wood turners who have not won a first, second or third prize in any Sydney Royal Easter Show section of wood turning. The Exhibit must be turned with the grain of the timber running

parallel to the bed of the lathe. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Sydney Woodturners Guild Inc. Prizes 1st \$75, 2nd \$50, 3rd \$25.

**CLASS 292 - Model or Miniature in Wood made from scratch.** One article. Specifications on scale must be stated on the Application for Entry and included on actual piece. The use of kits is not permitted. Prize 1st \$50.

**CLASS 293 - Small Furniture Item.** Predominately in wood. One article. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Woodworkers Association of NSW. Prize 1st \$250.

**CLASS 294 - Wooden Box Work.** One article. Maximum size not to exceed 450mm x 300mm x 150mm. Prize 1st \$50 Cash Prize supported by Woodworkers Association of NSW. Prize 1st \$250.

CLASS 295 - Musical Instrument. Predominately in wood. One article. Prize 1st \$50.

The challenge for October was for Members to bring along tools they had sharpened based on the previous demo (Ken's sharpening). Members could also bring their jigs or aids to sharpening if they wanted to show them and talk about them.



Libby Beaman - Jacaranda shot glasses were finely made with a natural finish by request.



Tony Vidler - the 'turning work' in Tony's bread knife could not be faulted. This shellac finished piece was made of found wood.



Owen Holden - two well-made bowls, a Coolabah Burl bowl with epoxy had 'Organoil' and polyurethane finish.



Finn Thorvaldson - A lovely bowl was shown by Finn. His inventively named Jacaranda Mimosifolia /Silky Oak / Banksia bowl was finished with 'Shellawax' and 'Tripple E'.



Catherine Ritter - described some Specialised tools she'd shaped to use on her multicentre candlestick style 'Vortex' tool or gouge with no flute, and a 'pyramid' or three-sided point tool with flat, not concave faces.



John Donnelly - reminded us of the need to profile newly bought gouges prior to sharpening, Blue Gum (Eucalyptus Saligna) and three engraved bowls. A Drozda showing his example of a bowl gouge sharpened prior to profiling. John's hatstand was finished with a clear polyurethane, and he recommends a wipe on then cut back method for a run free result.



Collaboration - Not without effort, Chris saved a 31kg chunk of Sydney felled at Cammeray Golf Club. A collaborative work ensued. The platter, now reduced to about 3kg, was worked on jointly by Chris,

Jack, Ken and Angus.





Jenny Talbot - The design of Jenny's four pieces was influenced by operculum scars on Gum Nuts. Woods used were Camphor Laurel, Eucalyptus, spalted Jacaranda and Builders waste. A set of Darlow tool sharpening jigs and a drill bit gauge of two hex head nuts referenced last month's sharpening demo.

#### **QUIZ ANSWERS**

1/ Usually yes. Many Acacias have excellent shock resistance.

2/3000 rpm. Generally it is ideal to run the lathe as fast as possible, up to 3000 rpm, as long as vibration is kept to a safe and manageable level.

3/ Backing plates are used as spacers to vary the projection of the central screw on a faceplate. A selection of diameters is necessary so that the work mounted on the faceplate may be supported as close as possible to it's perimeter.

4/ Treen is that group of wooden domestic ware which is neither furniture nor architecture. Scoops, spoons, platters and bowls are typical examples.

5/ False. Carbon steel tools were commercially produced in England in 1751.
