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FALLS PREVENTION - Eyesight

Impaired vision can increase your risk of falling as it is harder for you to see hazards such as obstacles, uneven footpaths, edges of steps or objects, and spills on the floor.

- Decreased colour vision

MT.2 THREE STEP BUFFING SYSTEM: A durable wax finish with MT.2 lathe-mounted polishing system. Buffing passes are made with a Tripoli buff (linen wheel), White Diamond buff (linen/flannel wheel), then Carnuba wax (flannel wheel).

The final finish is very similar to multiple coats of lacquer but is softer and much deeper. Including: 3pcs 8" fabric buffing wheels 1pc Tripoli bar, 1pc White diamond bar, 1pc Carnuba wax bar. 1pc MT.2 heavy duty lathe mandrel which holds the buffing wheels. The system requires a lathe with a minimum of 1/2HP. It is recommended that the final piece be pre-treated with Danish Oil.




NEW BOOK BY MIKE DARLOW – SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS MEMBER.

My new sharpening book is now available.

Sharpening Woodturning Tools (SWT) is the seventh book in Mike Darlow's colour woodturning series. It is now available in Australasia, North America and Europe only via Amazon's print-on-demand facility.

SWT explains why and shows how you can sharpen economically, quickly, with repeatable accuracy, and less often.

It achieves this by first explaining the principles (fundamental truths) of woodturning and sharpening which should determine how tools are sharpened. In doing so *SWT* shows that much of the huge volume of sharpening advice produced since 1956 has not been soundly based on these principles. *SWT* then discusses materials and equipment, and lastly how to optimally sharpen the different tool types.



Publication and buying

The introduction of YouTube has adversely affected the viability of conventionally publishing how-to books. Mike has therefore published *SWT* using Amazon's print-on-demand facilities.

BOOK REVIEW.

Firstly, I must point out that the following opinions are my personal opinions.

When I started reading this book, I started by trying to summarize the book chapter by chapter. I then realized that Mike had already done this, (see By Hand and Eye January 2024. The books stated aim is to collect, summarize and simplify the large pile of books on different Grinding/Sharpening ideas that exist in the Woodturning world into one book.

Because the summary was already out there, I switched direction and started noting down my impressions and thoughts. What follows is those.

Years ago, like many new woodturners I was told that sharpening woodturning tools was a fine art acquired over many years and requiring years of practice. In fact, in some ways, it appeared almost like a "Black Art" with almost mystical qualities required.

Each time I HAD to grind/sharpen my tools I approached the task with great trepidation. I was always worried that I would do something wrong and ruin a fairly expensive tool and then not be able to correct the mistake. Normally I only grind my tools once a year unless I accidently stick it in a chuck or something similar. The rest of the time I just hone them, and this works well for me and the amount of work I do with the tools.

Eventually I became fairly proficient at grinding my tools using various tricks like guides attached to the grinder, or marker pens etc. In fact, parts of this book confirmed some of the things that I have been doing as I learnt by trial and error. It was nice to have some things confirmed so I knew I was on the right track.

After reading this book I no longer have these concerns, and upon the recommendation of Mike I now use a jig, (much better). I now approach the task of grinding with more confidence. Basically, what he appears to be saying is that like woodturning grinding your tools is as much about what you like and what suits the task you are going to perform as anything. Nothing is written in blood on the floor. Certainly, some sharpening angles are going to be better than others, in reducing the number of times you have to go to the grinder and how quickly the edge dulls, but in the final analysis it is what suits you.

He takes the approach that there is what he calls the optimum grinding angle for each type of tool, and that is not necessarily the angle that the manufacturer put on the tool. Also, the angles that manufacturers put on the tools sometimes date from the days of carbon steel tools. Today we have High Speed Steel available as well as some more exotic steels. This must have an impact on the grind used on the tool.

There is a lot of technical detail in the book, which some people like, others maybe not so much, but you do not need to be a maths or physics professor to get what the book is talking about.

Chapter 3 deals with what happens when you put a tool to the grinding wheel or honer. While it is not essential to understand all the physics involved with grinding and honing it has given me a better understanding of what happens and why things can go wrong. It also offered some guidance on setting up grinders and what to look out for with maintenance and cleaning. There are lots of opinions and ideas on grinding using jigs of various types.

Chapter 4 points out that you should not assume that the manufacturer of a tool has made the tool ready for use, (A very interesting comment and something I have thought for some time, The ED). There are also ideas on using Bowl Gouges and some insight on why he does not sand his bowls – hmmmm. The book goes into sharpening different noses on Bowl Gouges.

The book does go into some detail on the authors own simple and inexpensive sharpening system. However, it also covers the pros and cons of the other systems.

At the beginning of this review, I said that the stated aim of the book was "to collect, summarize and simplify the large pile of books on different Grinding/Sharpening ideas that exist in the Woodturning world into one book." I think the book achieved its aim.

Personally, I would like to thank Mike for demystifying grinding and sharpening and bringing some common sense into this aspect of woodturning.

P.S. Mike if I have somehow got the wrong slant on this, I am happy to print your reply.

QUIZ ANSWERS

1/ The Chinese have used Oak [Quercus] on the nose cones of their rockets because it withstands the enormous heat generated on re-entry to the earth's atmosphere at 20 000 kilometres per hour. Although the top layer chars, the system works and it's cheap.

2/ John Wooller turns large-scale multi-centre sculptural pieces.

Stephen Hughes turns elegant ceremonial vessels often incorporating carving.

George Hatfield turns furniture and architectural components.

Vic Wood turns square edged bowls.

All these turners are versatile and all have had a great deal of influence on turning design.

3/ Tools made from carbon steel and high speed steel [HSS] can be honed to an equally sharp edge. HSS tools retain the edge a lot longer than carbon steel tools.

4/ It is possible to chase threads by hand at 1000 rpm but it is a lot easier at 300 rpm, mainly because the chaser moves across the work very quickly at 1000 rpm. This means that there is little time to remove the chaser at the end of each pass before the thread is damaged.

5/ In medieval England, the expression 'misterie of woodturning', meant the trade of woodturning. It included the concept that turning was a 'service' and 'a calling'. The term 'mysterie' didn't really carry the connotation of secrecy but medieval trade guilds attempted to protect their members by keeping their trade skills secret.

The members of the woodturners Guild in London faced competition from 'foreign' turners [those from the country and from overseas] and from joiners, carpenters, shipwrights and others. The Guild claimed that people from these trades were not competent to turn and, under the terms of its charter, frequently banned the sale of turned work that it judged to be defective. The 'foreign' turners also had their work banned sometimes and must have fumed as their 'faulty' work was scored and slashed so it couldn't be sold in London.
