



MT.2 THREE STEP BUFFING SYSTEM: A durable wax finish with MT.2 lathe-mounted polishing system. Buffing passes are made with a Tripoli buff (linen wheel), White Diamond buff (linen/flannel wheel), then Carnuba wax (flannel wheel).

The final finish is very similar to multiple coats of lacquer but is softer and much deeper. Including: 3pcs 8" fabric buffing wheels 1pc Tripoli bar, 1pc White diamond bar, 1pc Carnuba wax bar. 1pc MT.2 heavy duty lathe mandrel which holds the buffing wheels. The system requires a lathe with a minimum of 1/2HP. It is recommended that the final piece be pre-treated with Danish Oil.




#### NEW BOOK BY MIKE DARLOW – SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS MEMBER.

My new sharpening book is now available.

*Sharpening Woodturning Tools (SWT)* is the seventh book in Mike Darlow's colour woodturning series. It is now available in Australasia, North America and Europe only via Amazon's print-on-demand facility.

SWT explains why and shows how you can sharpen economically, quickly, with repeatable accuracy, and less often.

It achieves this by first explaining the principles (fundamental truths) of woodturning and sharpening which should determine how tools are sharpened. In doing so *SWT* shows that much of the huge volume of sharpening advice produced since 1956 has not been soundly based on these principles. *SWT* then discusses materials and equipment, and lastly how to optimally sharpen the different tool types.



#### **Publication and buying**

The introduction of YouTube has adversely affected the viability of conventionally publishing how-to books. Mike has therefore published *SWT* using Amazon's print-on-demand facilities.

#### FROM THE GUILD.

Also here, is a spoon jig, engineered by Jack with turned timber jaws that provide size adjustment flexibility. Another example is a split poly pipe chuck insert with cardboard packer for finishing turned eggs.



Tim MacGregor A selection of turned eggs in a Camphor wood bowl. Eggs have been turned from New Guinea Rose wood and Silky Oak, (finished With Aussie Oil) and accompanied by a "Granite" and Lindt Chocolate interlopers.



Jenny Talbot An eared Easter Bunny on a very light and fine Cedar dish. A small spinning top accompanied the Bunny.



Tony Vidler. Another example of an adjustable jig for use with spoon turning accompanied by three salt spoons all turned from Pine.



Ken Cooper A spoon with a difference. Turned in Pine with many variable centres.



John Titty Excellent examples of John's turning of smaller items. Three needle boxes from Merbau. A miniature specimen vase with glass insert from Tasmanian Oak and a "Tip-Top" that works! Nice work John!



Alex Bendeli Alex described many ways to turn a perfect sphere using a sharpened cylinder and emphasised the benefits of working to a sketch or detailed drawing. The use of pre-cut accurate templates was also emphasised. The egg and spoon, turned from garden Viburnum exemplifies this! We have now seen it all... the use of a silicon toilet seal as a jam "chuck".



#### **QUIZ ANSWERS**

1/ Because the spindles are likely to change shape. Moisture will leave the wood until it's moisture level reaches equilibrium with the surrounding air and this will release tensions in the wood which may result in distortion or splitting.

2/ The square sections at each end can be reinforced with masking tape, nails, screws, bolts, U clamps, hose clamps, metal bands, wedged steel rings or end plates.

3/ Ring centre. A well designed ring centre has a slender central pin. A thick pin is likely to split the work.

4/ A turning with an edge which has not been worked and retains the outer surface of the log, often with the bark.

5/ The Hittites (modern Syria) first forged iron tools in about 1400 B.C. This marked the beginning of the iron age.
