MAKING A WOODTURNING TOOL HANDLE BY PHILIP MCLEOD

I am often asked by new turners what is best. Should they buy a good set of tools or just use the club tools. My answer is always the same. In the beginning buy the steels and make your own handles. It is good practice, and you end up with a good set of tools at a reasonable price. I still use some of my original made tools when demonstrating.

Where do you buy the steels, McJing is a good source, (this is not a paid advertisement), but it is where I source my steels and ferruls.

Before going into the procedure for making a Woodturning Tool Handle we should become familiar with the parts of a tool.

The diagram below shows all the parts of a tool, in this case a Roughing Gouge.

The parts that will concern us the most in making a handle are:

- 1. The Tang of the Blade. You cannot see the Tang in this diagram, but it is the steel part that fits into the handle
- 2. The Ferrule this supports the tool and stops the wood from splitting
- 3. The Handle and the Butt



The diagram below shows a Parting Tool with the Tang circled.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAKING A HANDLE

The Main Steps in the process are, Turn the handle to round, Drill the hole for the Tang, Fit the Ferrule and Turn the Handle to suit your hand.

Detailed Instructions:

- 1. Select a suitable piece of wood Approximately 6 to 7 cm square and 30 cm long. The timber should be fairly straight grained and close grained. Fruit trees are best or Hickory, (if you can get it), but most hardwoods will be OK.
- 2. Mount the timber between centres using a standard 4 jaw chuck, bring up the tailstock with a Live Centre, (a cone type of Live Centre is best) and secure the timber in the lathe.
- 3. Use a Roughing Gouge to turn the timber into a cylinder.
- 4. Ensure that the chuck is holding the timber firmly and back the tail stock away.

- 5. Mount a Jacobs Chuck into the Tail Stock and using a drill bit of an appropriate size drill the hole for the Tang. ALWAYS USE THE LATHE FOR THIS AS IT WILL ENSURE THAT YOUR HOLE IS DEAD CENTRE OF THE HANDLE. Note: If the steel has a rectangular Tang make the hole a little bigger than the Tang, (timber springs back a bit when worked). If the tool has a tapered Tang you should first drill a small hole, then a larger hole. DO NOT drill all the way down with the bigger drill.
- 6. Take the tail stock away and test fit the tool. You want it to fit to within 10 or 15 mm of the shoulders of the tool.
- 7. Once you are happy with the fit remove the Jacobs Chuck. Reinstall the Cone Live Centre and bring it back into place so it is supporting the job. BE CAREFUL, do not put too much pressure on the Tail Stock as it may split the timber. Firm Pressure is all that is required.
- 8. Measure the length of the Ferrule and mark it onto the Handle at the end where you drilled the hole in the last step. It is good technique to allow a little extra space in case of a mistake in step 10.
- 9. Using Inside Callipers measure the inside diameter of the Ferrule and Transfer this measurement to a set of Outside Callipers. NOTE: Ferrules can be commercially purchased, or made from a piece of pipe, so the inside diameter may vary.
- 10. Using a Parting Tool reduce the diameter of the timber right at the end of the piece of timber to the inside diameter of the Ferrule. If you make it too small just take this part off and try again.
- 11. Test fit the ferrule by backing off the Tail Stock. You want a close fit, firm and not too lose. Turn the end to fit the Ferrule.
- 12. Once you are happy with the fit of the Ferrule, (do not worry if there is some wood protruding at the end) this can be removed later on the disc sander. It is time to turn the Handle.
- 13. Turn the handle in any shape you want. The main requirement is that it be comfortable to hold. You can test this while it is still mounted on the lathe.
- 14. Sand the Handle to the desired smoothness and apply the finish including any decoration or burnt rings as in the pictures on the previous pages. Any finish is suitable, Beeswax, Shellawax, EEE cream or Estapol.
- 15. Remove any excess timber from where the ferrule will go.
- 16. Assemble the tool. I use Araldite / Epoxy to glue the Ferrule and steel into the handle. Mix the glue and apply a little to the inside of the Ferrule, fit the Ferrule to the handle, fill the hole for the steel to about 2/3 full and drive the Tang into the hole ensure the tool is straight in the Handle. If some of the glue comes out of the hole wipe the excess away. Stand the tool where the glue can set. Epoxy / Araldite has some flexibility and good strength for tools.

FROM THE HISTORY FILES

The following is an extract from the booklet that was published as 20th Anniversary Sydney (1983 – 2003) Woodturners Guild Inc and was provided by Peter Herbert.

MACARTHUR REGION

The Macarthur Region formation was held in 1993 at Doug Burton's home with Guild members in attendance Doug Burton, George Bird, Peter Constantine, Keith Smith and Frank Bollins. It was determined that Robert Townson High School (RTHS) would be the place to hold meetings. Doug Burton was elected Convenor for the region.

The first meeting with eighteen members in attendance under the leadership of Convenor Doug Burton, was at RTHS. The meeting included talks by Frank Bollins, Don Dixon, Malcom Clark and Col Herbert on safety and care and maintenance of tools and all five lathes were put to work.

Initially, meetings were from 6pm to 9pm on the second Thursday of each month but later changed to the last Sunday of every second month from 10am to 3pm. Later mini meetings were introduced in the months between the main meetings at members homes, with members putting on sausage sizzle scones and jam cakes.

Doug Burton held the position of convenor until December 1996 after which George Bird took the Regional Convenors job which he held until 2001. Keith Smith took over in 2001 and is the present Convenor. Doug Burton took on the Regional Representatives job in April 1994 and continued in the role until 1996 when Peter Constantine took over. Peter held the position until 2001, handing over to John Jewell who is the present Regional Representative.

Macarthur Region have hosted demonstrations by Frank Bollins, Don Dixon, Malcolm Clark, Adrian Barendrogt, Ian Welfare, Warren Wrankin, Bruce Leadbeater, John Crawford, David Laird, Gary Light, Simon Priem, Lindsay Skinner and more.

Macarthur Region has made toys for New Guinea and after the tidal wave disaster. Toys have also been made for donation to the Salvation Army to give to needy children at Christmas.

Promotion Demonstrations have been conducted at Camden, and Campbelltown City Shows where the Blue Ribbon for best stand has been won on a number of occasions. A recent meeting held at Carrington Retirement Village, Camden to encourage retirees to take an interest in woodturning was a great success.

Members have increased from 16 at the first meeting to 57.

What are the physical health benefits of exercise?

heart disease; high blood pressure; diabetes; obesity and cancer • Exercise can help people with illnesses and conditions such as

stroke; Alzheimer's disease; Parkinson's disease and dementia • Physical activity can also help you maintain a healthy weight and improve your overall health.

• Different exercises can help you

lose weight if you need to build muscle mass and strength

• Exercise can also boost your self-esteem.

What are the mental health benefits of exercise?

• If you exercise regularly, it can help

reduce stress

boost your memory

reduce symptoms of mental health conditions like depression, anxiety or schizophrenia; and help with recovery from mental health issues

get outside be social and interact with other people

• Exercise can also improve your sleep. A good rest is important in both your physical and mental health, to

improve your concentration

How does exercise help my mental health?

• Exercise causes your brain to release 'feel good' chemicals like endorphins and serotonin that help improve your mood.

• It also improves your fitness, which can help lift your mood.

• Doing physical activity can also distract you from negative thought patterns.

How much exercise do I need?

• Australian guidelines recommend adults do at least 30 minutes of moderate to intensive physical activity on most or all days of the week.

- Combine your exercise routine with a healthy diet and other healthy lifestyle habits.
- While you exercise, you can also

practice steady breathing for self-awareness;

focus on keeping a good posture

How do I start exercising?

• When starting to exercise, it's important to stay within your limits.

• If you are not usually active, start with simple activities like going to the shops; gardening; household chores; and cooking

• At your own pace, try to build up to doing 30 minutes of moderate exercise each day, such as bike riding; walking; and swimming

• If you have a pedometer or smart watch, you can also monitor your steps and set walking goals. At first, aim for around 1,000 steps a day.

• Eventually, try to aim for 8,000 to 10,000 steps per day.

• You don't need to visit a gym to exercise. You can start exercising in a comfortable envi-ronment to build your confidence.

• You can exercise at home; outside; alone, with people you know, or with a class or group

• Consider ways you can incorporate exercise into your daily routine and lifestyle.

• When starting exercise, pick something you enjoy. You can use your friends or family as motivators to keep you on track.

• Enjoy the benefits of owning a pet — if you own a dog, make the most of your local area for their walks. You could walk in a park or by a beach if they are nearby.

• If you enjoy dancing, try a creative dance movement class. If ou enjoy art, visit a museum or gallery.

How do I overcome obstacles to exercising?

When starting exercise you may experience some barriers, but they can be overcome

Motivation and energy

- Mental health issues can be tiring. You may struggle with motivation for exercise.
- To overcome this, you can start slow and set small goals;
- Reward yourself for exercising;
- Try social exercise

• Remind yourself that exercise will help you rest better and feel less tired

Cost

• You may think that exercising is too costly. Gym memberships and home exercise equipment can be expensive. There are other, more affordable ways to exercise.

• Local community centres often have affordable exercise groups.

- See if your community has a free, local running group.
- Go for a walk around your block.
- Explore online exercise classes and exercise apps.

Anxiety or feeling intimidated

• You might feel uncomfortable exercising in a public place or joining a group exercise class. This is perfectly normal.

• To feel more comfortable and build your confidence, you can try taking a friend with you to an exercise class

• exercising in comfortable clothes

• download an app to exercise in your own home

Time

If you are short on time, there are things you can try to fit exercise into your routine.

• Break exercise into small chunks. Instead of doing 30 minutes in one go, do three lots of 10 minutes in a day.

• Try to wake up earlier.

• Try to walk around on your lunch break.

Physical limitations

• You may have physical obstacles such as an injury or disability that makes it difficult to ex-ercise. You may benefit from seeing a health professional such as a physiotherapist or ex-ercise physiologist to help you recover.

• They can suggest exercise options suitable for you, and help you plan activities.

MT.2 THREE STEP BUFFING SYSTEM: A durable wax finish with MT.2 lathe-mounted polishing system. Buffing passes are made with a Tripoli buff (linen wheel), White Diamond buff (linen/flannel wheel), then Carnuba wax (flannel wheel).

The final finish is very similar to multiple coats of lacquer but is softer and much deeper. Including: 3pcs 8" fabric buffing wheels 1pc Tripoli bar, 1pc White diamond bar, 1pc Carnuba wax bar. 1pc MT.2 heavy duty lathe mandrel which holds the buffing wheels. The system requires a lathe with a minimum of 1/2HP. It is recommended that the final piece be pre-treated with Danish Oil.

QUIZ ANSWERS

1/ The cambium layer is the zone between the sapwood and the bark. New cell growth occurs in the cambium layer.

2/ It would be very risky to use a wide shallow roughing gouge for faceplate work as it takes a wide shaving and this increases the chance of a severe dig-in which could throw the work off the lathe.

3/ A scratch gauge is a marking device for transferring key points of detail onto a turning. It usually takes the form of a piece of wood with sharpened nails projecting from an edge. These score the revolving work-piece at exactly the same points every time the gauge is used and so facilitate accurate repetition work. Scratch gauges are more accurate than pencil gauges and are especially useful for precisely marking shoulder lengths.

4/ The morse tapered opening in the headstock spindle, known as the swallow, may be used as a cup chuck to hold miniature goblets, small chess pieces and the like. To prepare timber place it between centers and turn a taper which roughly corresponds to a morse taper on one end. This is not too difficult if calipers are used to transfer the diameter of the prong centre at the swallow opening to a point about 15-20mm from the end of the blank. The taper may be judged by eye. The timber should be tapped firmly into the swallow with a hammer. It is not necessary to use great force and in any case this could damage the headstock bearings. A number two morse tapered swallow will securely hold a workpiece which projects up to about 80 mm.
