FROM THE HISTORY FILES

The following is an extract from the booklet that was published as 20th Anniversary Sydney (1983 – 2003) Woodturners Guild Inc and was provided by Peter Herbert.

MENAI REGION

In early 1994 some people by the names of Manny Burnham and George Edwards (both now deceased) tossed around an idea to increase "The Guilds" number of participating regions. The idea being to service the rapidly expanding population growth occurring within the area South of the Georges River, bounded by the Woronora River and extending south towards Heathcote and Engadine suburbs, generally known as the Menai area. Existing adjoining suburbs such as Narwee, Peakhurst, Padstow etc. were also considered as potential.

This Menai area really started to expand in size after 1973 as a result of the old Lugarno vehicular ferry crossing the Georges River being replaced by the opening of the Alfords Point bridge. This led to many suburbs springing up such as Bangor, Illawong, Alfords Point, Barden Ridge, etc. with an estimated population being now well in excess of 31,000.

The foresight of Messrs Burnham and Edwards led to a meeting of interested people being held on March 15, 1994, culminating in the establishment of The Menai Region of the Sydney Woodturners Guild. From those attending this inaugural meeting, elections for the positions of Menai Region Guild representative and Menai Region Convenor were made, Phil Simpson and Gwyn Joseph respectively. It is also reported that George Edwards, considered an expert in the art and techniques of toolmaking and tool sharpening, had the privilege at this meeting to be the first Menai Regions demonstrator by portraying his skills in chisel sharpening.

Not long after the commencement of Menai Region, Harold Kershaw was elected as Menai Region Treasurer. A post he diligently held until 2002.

Gwyn Joseph remained Convenor through 1996 whereupon Phil Simpson was charged with taking on both Convenors and Region Reps. Positions which he dutifully carried out until 1999.

In 1999 we saw a change in positions with Ron Fisher being elected as Regional Rep. and Gary Light being elected to the position of Convenor. Ron stayed on as Regional Rep. through 2002 whereupon Keith Worsley was elected and is the current Regional Rep. Gary relinquished the Convenors position in 2000 whereupon Phil Simpson once again was elected as Convenor.

In 2001 Alan Stevens was elected to the position of Convenor and in 2003 he relinquished that position to our current elected Convenor Bill Black. Phillippa Biswell was elected on 2002 to take over the Treasurers position and is the current treasurer.

The Menai Region hold their meetings and workshops at the Menai High School utilising the schools five lathes for a fully hands on approach to woodturning. We are very appreciative to the school's management for allowing us this privilege and use of the equipment and amenities. Our once a month meetings are held on a Tuesday evening from 6pm to 9pm to coincide with the school term timetables. During the longer summer vacation period, and with the school closed we usually organise to hold a January full day function

including BBQ lunch at one of our members premises. Members spouses/partners are invited to attend on this day and share in the friendly atmosphere.

In the startup years of the Menai Region there was a fluctuating attendance at the monthly meetings with an average of between 3-5 members regularly attending. Today the regular attendance would average 20 members from a probable 30, all of whom are at various skill levels in woodturning. There is a considerable knowledge base held by the attending members stemming from their various backgrounds. It is most invigorating and encouraging to attend the meetings and listen to the knowledge being freely shared with many a problem being solved on the evening.

We are privileged in having Gary Light, a skilful, and well known woodturner, participate regularly at our monthly meetings. He is constantly supervising the lathe and workshop activities, and he freely and frequently advises, and coaches new and old members of the rudimentary basics required in woodturning. Gary has given many demonstrations, including handout materials, especially emphasising lathe and tool safety procedures together with the fundamental techniques and use of the common chisels. He is ably supported in the workshop by Phil Frisardi who is always keen to assist our new members at their first hands on and ongoing assaults into woodturning.

Occasionally members of our Menai Region assist and participate with other Regions at Guild approved functions endeavouring to promote the SWG. Members have exhibited various pieces of their works in prominent places within and outside the Region. Menai and Hurstville Libraries being some of the showcase exhibits held within the Region.

WHAT IS MORE ACCURATE: YOUR SPEEDO OR THE GPS? (Avoiding High Blood Presssure when you are doing posted speed limit and you are overtaken by some one).

The answer is not as simple as it first sounds, it is subject to lots of factors and circumstances

Speedometer: Unless you have your speedometer recently custom calibrated, all speedometers in cars manufactured and sold in Australia after 1st July 2006 must comply with Australian Design Rules which strictly provide that your car's speedo must not show a speed lower than your actual speed. To avoid liability, therefore, all car manufacturers calibrate the car speedo to show a speed higher than the speed you are actually travelling at. On an unmodified car, this higher calibration may be just 1kph, but usually it may in fact show a speed of up to 5% higher. This may depend on the model and the manufacturer. If the car is modified by installation of a tyre different to standard, such as a "lower profile tyre" (or the opposite, a "fat pack all terrain tyre") or if your tyre pressure is low (or high) or dependent on the wear on the tyre, your speed as shown on your speedometer may be way out of whack. This is because the speedo shows the speed calibrated according to the number revolutions of the wheel and any change in the circumference of the tyre compared to the standard circumference as calibrated will not vary the speed shown but does vary the distance travelled (either faster or slower) during a calculated period of time (ie. kilometres per hour). A good rule of thumb to follow is if your wheels and tyres on your vehicle have a larger rolling diameter, your speedometer will show a slower speed than you are travelling. If you have wheels and tyres with a smaller rolling diameter, your speedometer will show a faster speed than you are actually travelling.

Global Positioning System (GPS): GPS speedometers are unregulated by governments. It is accepted that they will in most circumstances show your actual speed regardless of the tyre variables discussed above. BUT! There can be a time lag between when a speed is recorded and when it appears in your app such as when you travel on a slope or around winding curves. Also GPS does not work in some tunnels or satellite dead spots, meaning there are times when a GPS speedometer does not work at all.

What is important to remember is that when you go downhill, the GPS measures the horizontal distance, even though that distance is just one of the sides of a triangle, and you actually travel the distance made up of the hypotenuse (and therefore you travel a longer distance in that timeframe and therefore travel faster than the speed shown by the GPS!! The reverse is true.

So, what happens if you are caught by the police "speeding"? Police use many methods

to check the speed of cars travelling on the roads. They use specialised mobile radar units, as well, in all highway patrol cars specially calibrated speedometers are installed, and also, police are trained to make "speed estimates" that the Courts accept as "expert evidence". As for the radar device and the speedometer used, each different police force in Australia has rules that require regular calibration tests, and tickets issued while using expired tests become inadmissible (but this happens rarer the finding a needle in a haystack). In fact, in most (if not all) jurisdictions the enabling legislation provides that the reading of the radars or specialised speedometers are deemed to be precise and absolute evidence of speed. Even if you prove that your speedo or GPS showed a different speed, it is no defence to the fine as intention is not a relevant factor. Also, even if your car is fitted with a dashcam that takes video that displays your speed as shown on the GPS, it will in most likelihood not be accepted if you decide to fight your speeding infringement notice based on a radar or speedometer checked speed. In the case of a fine based on the "expert evidence" of the estimated speed, only on the very rare occasion will the Court not accept the accuracy of that evidence of estimated speed.

As for civil cases where the speed of a car involved in a collision becomes an issue, then such video evidence of speed may be used. Even where the GPS speed is not recorded on the video, there are expert witnesses who can be engaged to estimate the speed of the car by triangulating the car's position to its surroundings shown in the video, but this is really expensive!



The Cammeray Project



In 2023, the SNB Woodturners Club turned what has become known within our Club as the "Collaboration Platter" - a large trophy-like platter for the Cammeray Golf Club. A number of people were involved in turning the platter, hence the term "collaboration".

The timber for the platter (Sydney Blue Gum, Eucalyptus saligna), was sourced from one of the larger trees on the Golf Course which was cut down as part of the remodelling of the Golf Course associated with the Warringah Freeway Upgrade/Western Harbour Tunnel project.

The Collaboration platter is now proudly displayed in the newly-refurbished Cammerary Golf Clubhouse and is awarded annually to recognise outstanding environmental contribution and achievement at the Golf Club.

In 2024, we were asked by Cammeray Golf Club if we could turn another six items. These would be given to the winners of golf championship/tournament events, for the winner to keep at their home for a 12-month period. The substantive trophy (most of which are preexisting 'silverware') are traditionally presented to the winner and then returned to their place inside a trophy cabinet at the Clubhouse. The only requirement was that the turned item had to be from wood that came from a tree that grew on the Cammerary Golf Course and which was cut down as part of the Golf Course redesign/freeway upgrade project.

From his time working on the Freeway/tunnel Project, Chris Falvey still had a limited stash of cut logs from trees felled as part of the Golf Course redevelopment. There were two flat blanks of Southern Silky Oak (Grevillea robusta), two logs of Sydney Blue Gum, one log of Tallowood (Eucalyptus microcorys), and two logs of Paperbark Melaleuca (Melaleuca quinquenervia).

Chris would like to express his thanks to his fellow 'collaborateurs' for being part of this project, for their generous gift of time, and acknowledge their amazing skills as woodturners.

Due to rep being unable to attend the monthly meetings. There was no report.



Kooloora are now charging the group \$95 per quarter for electricity.


Kooloora have acquired a Tag and Test machine. As soon as someone is trained to use it, they will be testing all their, and the sheds electrical equipment.
